Six years ago the women's liberation movement started out radical, strong, lively and on the offensive—and it spread like wildfire.

No issue was too sacred to be investigated by personal experience or to keep our analysis and conclusions from being taken before the public in the most powerful way we were able. Our demands for abortion law repeal, child-care centers, men sharing the housework, job equality, the right to wear pants anywhere, and the assertion that men, not women, were the ones who must change, spoke to the anger and longing of women all over the world.

Today all the trappings of the early radical upsurge remain, but the content and style have been watered down. Operating on its initial momentum only, the movement is now slowing down. We have reached a point when the movement must have a revival of the radical ideas and leadership which marked its early growth and success.
